

The National Lottery Community Fund

The National Lottery Community Fund gives grants to organisations in the UK to help improve their communities. They're the largest single source of funding for community activities in the UK. National Lottery players contribute around £30 million to good causes every week.

The National Lottery Community Fund distributes around £600m a year to communities across the UK for projects that support communities to come together, to be environmentally sustainable, to help children and young people thrive and to enable people to live healthier lives. Grant programmes are open all year round.

Arts Council England

Arts Council England is the national development agency for creativity and culture. They distribute funding to individuals, arts organisations, libraries, and museums through Arts Council National Lottery Project Grants up to £100,000 and for individual artists through Arts Council England Developing Your Creative Practice Grants up to £12,000. The programme sets out to achieve ACE's mission, 'great art and culture for everyone'. Grant programmes are open all year round.

Crowdfund Lancashire

Crowdfund Lancashire gives local communities a chance to create and support the projects which matter most to them. It enables everyone to contribute towards their community – chipping in as little as £2 to help bring ideas to life. Crowdfund Lancashire is working in partnership with Spacehive, the UK's leading community crowdfunding platform, to create, fund and deliver your project idea through the annual Lancashire Culture and Sport Fund. Organisations could get up to £20,000 to boost projects towards their funding target. Parish and Town Councils can take part too, with up to £5,000 available. Individuals with ideas and businesses who want to benefit their community could get £1,500 towards their live crowdfunding campaigns. Round 2 of Crowdfund Lancashire is now open and will close on Tuesday 18 July 2023.

The Harris Charity


The Harris Charity can help young people under the age of 25 years who live in Lancashire (with priority given to those living in the Preston District). The Trustees have wide powers of discretion to relieve need, hardship and distress, and to promote activities for social and community wellbeing.

The Harris Charity can make available grants to alleviate need, hardship or distress but it is not authorised to give money for rates, taxes or other public funds.

It can make grants for books, equipment or appropriate training and education where deprivation exists. It can also give funding for facilities and equipment for recreation or other leisure time occupations in the interests of social welfare.

Community Foundation For Lancashire

An independent charity that promotes local giving to address local disadvantage through range of different funds.

Since 2007, they have distributed in excess of £16 million to charities and community groups in Lancashire, including lesser-known charities operating at a grassroots level; ensuring charitable awards create lasting change.

Lancashire County Council Local Member Grants Scheme

Lancashire County Council's Local Member Grants Scheme helps Lancashire county councillors to support the vital work of voluntary, community and faith sector (VCFS) groups.

The grants can be used to fund projects that will directly benefit the community, from gardening workshops and knit and natter sessions, to football activities to help young people stay active.

Groups can apply for a grant, and their local county councillor will decide which applications are accepted and award a grant from their own budget.

The annual Local Member Grant budget for each county councillor will be £2,000 for each financial year. For the 2023/2024 financial year, an additional £500 has been given to each councillor in celebration of the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III. Please note that this extra funding is not restricted to funding events or activities directly related to the coronation.

The Duchy of Lancaster Benevolent Fund

The Fund is a Registered Charity established in 1993 with The late Queen's consent to benefit a wide range of causes throughout the County Palatine of Lancaster – in effect, the three counties of Lancashire, Greater Manchester & Merseyside.

In Lancashire, the Fund is administered from the Lieutenancy Office in County Hall, Preston to which all applications should be made by letter on the letterhead of the organisation. Generally, applications are considered at the end of the month in which they are received.

The Fund's current practice in Lancashire is to make one-off grants to help with specific needs of individuals, organisations and voluntary groups throughout the community for purposes for which statutory funding is not available. For example grants to groups and organisations may be made for the provision of equipment or the refurbishment of premises but are not normally given to support running costs. Repeat grants will not be given to the same organisation for at least three years. Normally, grants are of modest amounts, typically, less than £500.

Grants are not available for the following:

- i) *Uniformed Youth Groups (eg Scouts/Guides/Cadets)
- ii) Schools
- iii) Animal Welfare Charities
- iv) Hardship
- v) General Appeals
- vi) For work under the Disability Discrimination Act (or for similar purposes)
- vii) For Further or Higher Education
- viii) *Sports Clubs
- ix) Theatre Arts Training

*To be determined on a case-by-case basis - would be considered more favourably that if a grant was awarded, it would also provide a strong community benefit.

All decisions on applications are entirely at the discretion of the Fund and the Fund is unable to enter into any correspondence in connection with an unsuccessful application.

Grants available for: projects supporting disadvantaged children and young people Size of grants: Up to £40,000 per year over 1-3 years (overall maximum £120,000) and core costs to support the organisations running and operational costs. Burnley and Pendle in Lancashire are listed as areas of geographic interest to Children In Need. Next deadline: no deadlines.

Community Ownership Fund

Capital grants up to £250k; revenue grants up to £50k for community organisations to take sustainable ownership of community assets e.g. community buildings, community shops, parks at risk of being lost.

The National Lottery Heritage Fund

The Heritage Fund wants to encourage community and voluntary organisations to develop their own heritage projects. Exploring heritage can provide opportunities to unlock wider benefits for individuals and communities, such as improved wellbeing, providing skill development opportunities and creating great places to live and work.

With this in mind, the Heritage Fund is currently prioritising heritage projects that meet at least one or more of the following outcomes:

- A wider range of people will be involved in heritage (This is a mandatory outcome every project we fund must achieve our mandatory outcome as a minimum.)
- · people will have greater wellbeing
- · people will have developed skills
- the local area will be a better place to live, work or visit
- · the local economy will be boosted
- the funded organisation will be more resilient

<u>National Lottery Grants for Heritage</u> is their open programme for all types of heritage projects in the UK and awards range from £3k - £5 Million. Heritage can be anything from the past that people value and want to pass on to future generations.

Organisations can access advice and support from the Heritage Fund's Engagement Team in the North dependant on the level of funding they wish to apply for.

For grants of between £3k - £250k book onto a 'Helping you apply' webinar here.

These free online sessions will include the following:

- · How heritage can be used to transform places and change lives.
- · What a well-planned project looks like.
- · How to write a strong funding application to The National Lottery Heritage Fund.
- · The opportunity to share your project ideas and ask any questions you may have.

For <u>medium grants</u> of between £10k - £250k <u>submit a Project Enquiry via their application portal</u>. You will be contacted within 10 days by an Engagement Manager who can offer bespoke advice and guidance. This does not form part of the formal application process. For <u>large grants</u> of between £250k - £5m you must submit an <u>Expression of Interest via their application portal</u>. This is a compulsory competitive step, so make sure your project is well thought through, evidences need and demand, particularly from a wider range of people and meets one or more of our priority outcomes.

The Wolfson Foundation

The Wolfson Foundation want to contribute to the health, resilience and variety of our society. Most of their grants are for capital infrastructure — buildings (new build and refurbishments) and equipment. They also provide education and research grants for individuals. These programmes are administered and/or co-funded by partner organisations with the fundamental aim of improving the civic health of society, mainly through education and research, and supporting excellence in the fields of education, science and medicine, health and disability, and heritage, humanities and the arts.

They often make grants to act as a catalyst to generate more support and help to attract funding to areas that may otherwise be under-resourced. They are keen to encourage applications from parts of the UK where we have traditionally received fewer applications or where there are few other sources of funding.

Their decision-making is rigorous and grants are awarded based on expert peer review. However, they run a relatively light-touch application process which allows you to present ideas in a way that brings your project to life. You don't need to be a large or well-known organisation to apply. They are always happy to discuss questions during the application process. All applications receive a formal response.

Before you apply for funding, please <u>check the types of places The Wolfson Foundation funds</u> and their specific funding criteria.

It was established in 1958 by the Weston family and is one of the largest and most respected charitable institutions in the UK which has donated over £1 billion in total.

The Bernard Sunley Foundation

The Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation is an independent grant-making charity. Funds are given to charities registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales. They can help fund new buildings, new minibuses, church projects, hospices, museums, galleries. Grants are awarded to those specifically applying for assistance towards capital projects. Grants are from £1,000 upwards and the majority of grants awarded are under £5,000.

They have a preference for front line organisations working directly with people in need. Size of grants given: £2,000-£10,000 for one year.

Top Tips

Check for fit and eligibility

Always check that you are eligible for the funds you want to apply for and that the key themes and priorities of the funding programme align with the objectives and themes of your proposed project before you write a bid application. This will ensure you focus your time and efforts on funds/funders where there is the best chance of success.

Do your research

It's wise to research what your preferred funders have invested in previously and who they have invested in, in your area. If funders have already invested a considerable sum in supporting those you currently work with, or in the locations where you deliver, they may not want to invest any more.

Access free help and advice on making a funding application

Evaluation criteria

Before you begin writing your application, make sure you read the evaluation criteria set out by the funder. What criteria will they be assessing your application against? What do they want to hear? To maximise your chance of success, make sure your application speaks to this criteria directly.

Provide context and evidence

Including relevant statistics to help evidence the need for your project will strengthen your application. This might also mean consulting the people who will benefit from your project before you apply and involving them in the planning stage of your project. For additional information on local statistics to support your application visit <u>Lancashire Insight</u>.

Start with your budget

When writing your application, it can be helpful to start with your budget first. This will help you to determine whether the grant amount you are requesting will realistically enable you to deliver the project in the way that you want, or whether you need to ask for more. Don't underestimate. List everything that you will need

to do (labour time) and need to purchase (physical resources). Remember the hidden costs - insurance, travel, volunteer expenses, stationery etc. What other money might you need to fundraise and where will this come from? Think about whether you can generate income from your activity - you need to build this into your budget too. Do you have any 'in kind' contributions?

Project ownership and management

It's important to determine the role and responsibilities of your group or organization in managing your project's delivery and finances. Does the person managing the finances have experience of managing money and / or managing grant funding? Who will issue contracts for any freelance support you bring in to help deliver your project?

Measuring your success

Funders often want to know how you will collect information to show your project is a success, so it's important to consider how you will do this at the application stage. This could include counting the number of people who take part, asking people to complete a survey about how they have benefited from the activities and discussing the project at your

committee meeting to identify ways it went well and things that could have been improved. Larger projects may need to attach professional evaluators to the project and their costs will need to be included in your budget.

Documentation

Most funders will want to see evidence that your group has:

- A committee
- A bank account
- A statement of your accounts for the last financial year (unless you are a new group)
- A governing document (e.g. constitution, trust deed, memos and articles).

Before you apply, make sure you have all the documents you need.

Test vour draft application

Before you submit your funding application, consider sharing a draft with a trusted colleague or a critical friend who has not been part of the bid writing process. A fresh pair of eyes can help to sense check your work, ensure consistency and that your message can be conveyed to non-specialists and identity any weaknesses, errors or omissions in your response to the questions posed by the funder.


